

Estar Sulo Be"



One of the most common verbs you will use in Spanish is edur, which means "to be." It is an irregular verb, which means that it does not conjugate according to the rules.

estar (to be)

VO	estoy	nosotros/-as	estamos
tú	estás	vosotros/-as	estáis
él/ella/Ud.	está	ellos/ellas/Uds.	están

Refer to this example when you need to decide what each part of a verb means:

yo estoy = I am
tú estás = you (sing.) are
él/ella está = he/she/it is
usted está = you (formal) are

nosotros estamos = we are vosotros estáis = you (pl., informal) are ellos/ellos están = they are ustedes están = you (pl., pl./formal) are

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## Estar von Be"




In Spanish, there are two different verbs that mean "to be." Both ester and ser mean "to be," but they are used in different ways.

## Some basic uses of estar:

- ► To express location

  Estoy en coso. = 1 am at home.
- To express a temporary state
   Ustedes están enfermos. = You are sick.



► To ask and answer questions of "where?"
¿Dónde están los niños? = Where are the boys?
Los niños están en la cafetería. = The boys are in the cafeteria.
